Impact on Cat Population

- **Reduction in stray cat population over time**
 - Litter size
 - Litter frequency
 - Reproductive Age
- **Potential Number of Kittens**
 - Annual average
 - Lifetime total
- **Exponential Impact**

Positive Outcomes

Health Improvements

- **Reduction in Disease Transmission**
 - Feline Leukemia Virus and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus
 - Upper Respiratory Infections
- **Improved General Health and Longevity**
 - Decreased Reproductive-Related Health Issues
 - Lowered Risk of Injuries
- **Behavioral Improvements**
 - Reduced Roaming and Aggression
 - Lower Stress Levels
- **Enhanced Nutritional Status**
- **Overall Colony Health**
