## 6. <u>Presentation</u>

a. 21-368 PID 101 - Steve Parker, City Manager

#### Indexes:

City Manager Steve Parker introduced Jon Snyder with P3 Works who provided a PID 101 presentation to the City Council. PID is a financial process or tool which is strictly approved by the City Council. There is no impact to the citizens of your community. It can be used for infrastructure, drainage, building improvements. Highly lucrative economic development tool can be useful when negotiating with developers. Grows the City's tax base without obligating City revenues. PID's can be used to forward the City's Comprehensive Plan, Thoroughfare Plan, and Parks Plan.

How is a PID created?

- 1. PID Petition submitted by developer
- 2. Professional Services executed and developer funds deposited with City
- 3. Public Hearing on advisability of creating a PID
- 4. Preparation of Service and Assessment Plan, PID Finance Agreement, and bond documents (if bonds are contemplated)
- 5. Public Hearing on levy of assessment
- 6. Assessment Ordinance, Service and Assessment Plan, and bond documents approved by City Council
- 7. Typically a 6 month process but timeline can vary widely

Financial Implications for the City:

PID Debt is non-recourse to the City

Bonds or Reimbursement Agreements are backed only by the assessments on the property within the PID

Issuance of PID debt by the City does not reduce the City's Bonding capacity City keeps all of its ad valorem and sales tax revenues Counts against Bank Qualified Debt limit

PID Creation and Administration:

All City costs incurred as a result of creating the PID should be paid by the developer via a cash escrow deposit with the City

Administration is typically contracted to a third party, overseen by the City and paid for by the PID at the same time and in the same manner as the annual installments of the assessments

More than \$1.1 billion in PID debt has been issued by Texas Municipalities since January 2017

Guadalupe County vaccines to date - one dose 91,209 and fully vaccinated 80,956 Estimated population 12 years and older 139,873 57.88% of population vaccinated

Guadalupe Regional Medical Center update:

11 people currently hospitalized

5 people in critical care (decreased of 50% since October 4 meeting)

Guadalupe County is teaming up with the National Guard to provide the community with multiple Covid-19 shot clinics. All clinics will be walk-in events and no registration required. Pfizer & Moderna vaccine be offered (1st dose only) on 11/4/2021 at the Seguin Performing Arts Center, 1315 E. Cedar Street, Seguin from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm.
